

Finally, I hope all of you will enjoy participating in this forum and find it a rewarding experience. Thank you.





# **Opening Keynote Address**

Hong Kong Time: Nov 30, 09:30am

### **Mrs Elizabeth Iro**

Chief Nursing Officer World Health Organisation Switzerland

Elizabeth Iro is the World Health Organization Chief Nursing Officer (CNO) who commenced in this role in January 2018. She is based in Geneva, Switzerland.

Mrs Iro is from the Cook Islands, prior to taking up her role in WHO she served as her country's Secretary of Health since 2012-2017. She was the first nurse/midwife and woman to be appointed in this role in the Cook Islands. Her priorities while in this role focused on legislative reforms to strengthen the country's health system and developing National Health Strategic plans (2012-2016, 2017-2021) and a National Health Road Map 2017-2036. Mrs Iro was trained in New Zealand as a nurse and a midwife and holds a MHSc in Nursing and a MBA. She held various nursing roles such as Chief Nursing Officer (2011-2012), Registrar of the Nursing Council (2000-2007) as well was the President of the Cook Islands Nurses Association (2002-2010).



#### **Topic: A New Page for Nursing**

As the nursing profession moves forward from the peak of the COVID-19, the WHO Chief Nursing Officer, Mrs Elizabeth Iro, will discuss the impact of the pandemic on the nursing workforce. She will focus on the need to strengthen nursing and midwifery through the implementation of the WHO Nursing and Midwifery Global Strategic Directions (SDNM) 2021-2025, highlighting the importance of collecting evidence and data.

Mrs Iro will talk about the importance of nursing leadership in the development of healthcare systems and will emphasize the need to grow and nurture nurses who are in the early part of their nursing careers to ensure we build a strong global profession with the skills required to ensure Universal Health Coverage and health for all.

The address will outline the priorities of the World Health Organization for the next five years and identify the ways in which nurses can contribute to this agenda, particularly around primary health care, mental health care and the climate crisis.

The session will conclude with a call to protect the nursing workforce and to ensure that nurses are supported to manage their own mental health and wellbeing.

### **Dr Christine Grady**

Christine Grady is a nurse-bioethicist, senior investigator, and Chief of the Department of Bioethics at the National Institutes of Health Clinical Center. Her research focuses on clinical research ethics, including informed consent, vulnerability, study design, and recruitment, international research ethics and on ethical issues faced by nurses and other healthcare providers.

Dr Grady has authored more than 200 papers in the biomedical and bioethics literature and authored or edited several books, including The Oxford Textbook of Clinical Research Ethics. She is an elected fellow of the Hastings Center and the American Academy of Nursing, a research fellow at Kennedy Institute of Ethics and an elected member of the National Academy of Medicine. Dr Grady holds a B.S. in nursing and biology from Georgetown University, a M.S.N. in community health nursing from Boston College, and a Ph.D. in philosophy from Georgetown University.



#### **Grace Tien Lecture**

#### Topic: Contemplating Ethics: What Does a New Page for Nursing Entail?

Using the frame of nurses as moral agents with moral responsibilities, I will explore the ethical challenges that nurses faced before and during COVID, and describe some of the challenges that COVID has created or exacerbated; and define and discuss the phenomena of moral distress and moral strength. I will then propose five categories of approaches to move us forward to a new page by supporting the moral work of nurses and improving healthcare systems, including care, compensation, culture, community, and creativity.

### **Dr Beverly Malone**

President and CEO National League for Nursing The United States

Under Dr Malone's leadership, the National League for Nursing (NLN) has advanced the science of nursing education by promoting greater collaboration among stakeholders, increasing diversity in nursing and nursing education, and advancing excellence in care for patients. Dr Malone's distinguished career has mixed policy, education, administration, and clinical practice, including as federal deputy assistant secretary for health under President Bill Clinton.

As a reviewer, she contributed to the groundbreaking Institute of Medicine (IOM) report, "The Future of Nursing: Leading Change, Advancing Health," and served on the Minority Health Federal Advisory Committee. She serves on the Kaiser Family Foundation Board of Directors and the Institute for Healthcare Improvement Board of Directors and has received more than 20 honorary doctorates.

In 2022, Dr Malone was honored by the American Nurses Association with the prestigious President's Award. Dr Malone was also named one of the 50 Most Influential Clinical Executives by Modern Healthcare. She was featured as one of 25 Outstanding Women for Women's History Month by Diverse: Issues in Higher Education. Additionally, Dr Malone was honored as part of the 2022 STATUS List, the most definitive accounting of leaders and influencers in the life sciences, as well as one of 12 Influential Persons in Health, Science and Innovation by Morehouse School of Medicine. And she was included on HealthTech's list of 30 Healthcare IT Influencers Worth a Follow in 2022.

In 2021, Modern Healthcare honored her with a Top 25 Women Leaders' Luminary Award, named her to the inaugural list of five Minority Healthcare Luminaries and included her amongst the 100 most influential people in healthcare. She was previously honored on their list of Top 25 Women in Healthcare. Additionally, the International Society of Psychiatric-Mental Health Nurses (ISPN) honored her with the Living Legends Award.

Similarly, 2020 Dr Malone was ranked No. 5 in Modern Healthcare's Top 100 Most Influential People, received the University of Cincinnati's Linda Bates Parker Legend Award, named an Honorary Member of the Philippine Nurses Association of America and presented with a special award of distinction by the NLN Board of Governors. Also, she was bestowed the Gail L. Warden Leadership Excellence Award by The National Center for Healthcare Leadership and designated by the American Academy of Nursing with their Highest Nursing Honor, "Living Legend."

The Alpha Omega Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau and the College of Nursing of Adelphi University, Long Island honored Dr Malone with the Lifetime Achievement Award in 2019. She was presented with a citation from the American Psychological Association for her outstanding leadership in advancing excellence in healthcare for the nation and global community, was named one of the Top 25 Minority Executives in Healthcare by Modern Healthcare magazine and accepted the Nursing Outlook Excellence in Research Award in 2018.

Elected two terms as president of the American Nurses Association (ANA) representing 180,000 nurses and served as the first US and African American general secretary of the United Kingdom (UK) Royal College of Nursing (RCN) representing 400,000 nurses. A member of the UK as well as US delegation to the World Health Assembly, she was also vice chair of the Brussels-based European Federation of Nurses Association. Furthermore, she has the distinguished honor of her portrait being displayed at the National Portrait Gallery in London, United Kingdom.



#### Topic: The Future Is Here; It's Just Not Everywhere

The Mission Statement is the North Star that illuminates the pathway to the Future. In the night sky from different locations, the North Star is more visible to some than to others. Let us as a profession, lean on and share with one another our vantage point in locating and using the North Star as our Guide. When I can't see my way forward, my colleague has a clear view and because I value him or her I can travel from where I am to where we need nursing and healthcare to be.

While the future is here and NOT everywhere, almost 28 million nurses across the globe, are everywhere. There is not a healthcare door in hospital or communities, rural or urban, low or high income countries, that you will not find a nurse. If we can only learn to co-create, collaborate, cooperate, coordinate and believe in the power of nursing, we will demand and transform our Now into the Future.

### **Professor Peng Gong**

Professor, Chair of Global Sustainability Vice-President and Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Academic Development) The University of Hong Kong Hong Kong

Peng Gong is Chair Professor of Global Sustainability and Vice President for Academic Development, The University of Hong Kong. He had taught in Canada (U of Calgary), USA (UC Berkeley), and China (Tsinghua). He served as the founding Director of the State Key Laboratory of Remote Sensing Science, and the founding Chair of the Department of Earth System Science and Dean of Science at Tsinghua University. His major research interests include mapping and monitoring global environmental change, and modelling environment-related infectious diseases, climate and health and healthy cities.



#### **Topic: Climate Change and Global Health**

In 2009, Lancet has published a commissioned report on health and climate change, which stated "climate change is the greatest threat to human health in 21st century." In 2015, Lancet published a second report on the same subject. It carefully examined the relation between climate change and health from five aspects. It started with a scientific assessment of global population exposure to various climate threats, followed by climate change adaptation strategies, mitigation technologies and global efforts, economic tools to combat climate change and policy options. It came up with 10 recommendations to the global community to respond to climate change from a global health perspectives. The last recommendation was to establish a Lancet countdown to 2030 by publishing annual assessment of global actions on a national basis to combat climate change in order to protect human health. Thereafter, an annual report was published in Lancet each year.

In this presentation, a highlight of major findings of this series of Lancet reports will be first reported. Progresses and obstacles at the global scale will be summarized. Other global health efforts in response to global environmental challenges will be presented. Future efforts will be suggested to address remaining gaps.

### **Professor Sally Thorne**

Professor School of Nursing The University of British Columbia Canada

Sally Thorne, RN, PhD, FAAN, FCAHS, FCAN, is a Professor in the School of Nursing at the University of British Columbia, Canada where she has maintained a longstanding program of substantive research in the fields of chronic illness, cancer experience and end-of-life approaches as well as scholarship in philosophy of science, including the epistemological basis of disciplinary knowledge development in the health fields, and the nature of evidence claims in a complex health policy environment. She is the author of a body of applied qualitative methodological writing, including the popular text now in its second edition Interpretive Description: Qualitative Research for Applied Practice (New York & London: Routledge, 2016). She served as Associate Editor for the multidisciplinary journal Qualitative Health Research (Sage) for over a decade, and since 2011 has been Editor-in-Chief for a journal that deals with critical scholarship in nursing and health care Nursing Inquiry (Wiley). Professor Thorne has also served as Board Director for numerous health care and research organizations, including the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences, Canadian Partnership Against Cancer, and the Canadian Association of Nurses in Oncology. She holds honorary doctorates from Queen's University (2013) and Université Laval (2017), and in 2017 was inaugurated into Sigma Theta Tau International's Nurse Researcher Hall of Fame.



#### Topic: Reflections on the Importance of Qualitative Research in the Evolving World of Health Care

As the enthusiasm for qualitative approaches to research takes hold across health care disciplines, it seems important to reflect on the kinds of contributions that these investigations have made and can make to the wider context of health care policy and planning. Thinking beyond our individual research questions and into the ultimate ends of healthcare inquiry, we can begin to appreciate the relevance of coming together as a community of practitioners and scholars to ensure that such issues as patient and family experience, nuanced subjectivities, and the complexities of context are not lost in our ongoing process of change. In this presentation, Professor Thorne will reflect on some of these issues of the wider importance of ensuring a robust and strategic qualitative component to our evolving body of healthcare knowledge.

### **Professor Stephen Neville**

Professor and Head of Nursing School of Clinical Sciences Auckland University of Technology New Zealand

As Head of Nursing, Professor Neville is responsible for the strategic, academic and operational leadership and management of the discipline, and is tasked with advancing nursing at a local, national and international level. He is committed to developing research capability and capacity in nursing with a particular focus on early and midcareer nurse researchers. This is achieved through his role as Co-Director of the AUT Centre for Active Ageing (AUTCAA). A key focus of the AUTCAA is on ensuring communities promote healthy ageing and are appropriate places for older citizens to age in. He leads a programme of largely qualitative research on agefriendly communities utilising authentic co-design principles. His latest work is a codesign project with Pacific Island communities to support healthy ageing through eating, sleeping, socialising and being active. Pacific Island qualitative methodologies underpin this project, including the use of Talanoa which guides all aspects of this programme of research. Professor Neville's work influences policy, practice and education and has resulted in the development of publicly available resources for communities to use to support being accredited by the World Health Organisation as an Age Friendly Community. His reputation as a qualitative nurse researcher has resulted in a number of local, national and international appointments, including as a Fellow and life member of the College of Nurses Aotearoa (NZ). Professor Neville is also an Editor for the Journal of Clinical Nursing where he manages qualitative manuscript submissions through the review process to publication. The Journal of Clinical Nursing has an impact factor (2021) of 4.423 and journal citation reports (Clarivate, 2022) of 4/123 (Nursing) and 4/123 (Nursing (Social Science)). He is also a strategic advisory board member for the Ageing Well National Science Challenge and Minister for Seniors Age- Friendly Communities Taskforce, as well as an international member on the Australian National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) Dementia, Ageing and Aged Care Grant Assessment Committee. He is also an Adjunct Professor of Nursing at the University of Canberra, Western Sydney University and Edith Cowan University.

### **Professor Amanda Kenny**

Emeritus Professor Office of La Trobe Rural Health La Trobe University Australia

Professor Emerita Amanda Kenny is a nurse and midwife. She led the development of Australia's largest multidisciplinary rural health school. Her research involves extensive partnerships with vulnerable populations. Amanda is a leader in knowledge translation. She has led or contributed to highly cited policy documents, and as an expert witness, has given evidence to major government inquiries. In her career, Amanda has attracted almost AU\$104 million dollars of grant funding. She has strong international partnerships, currently holds international grants, and mentors staff and students from a multitude of universities. Amanda is Editor in Chief of the highly ranked journal, Nurse Education Today.



#### **Topic: Education and Training in Qualitative Research**

In the last few years, there has been a significant shift in research involving humans. Researchers from all backgrounds increasingly recognise that predictability, control, and exact determination of phenomena is difficult and complex to achieve. Implementing interventions is not easy as human beings are not predictable and their reactions and interactions are often different to expectations.

There has been a proliferation of what is described as qualitative research. Anything that is non-numerical is given the qualitative title. Reading much of this research reminds me of the concept of method slurring that I first encountered more than three decades ago.

Solid research education and training are more critical than ever. The value in qualitative research is in the lens that researchers bring to their research and the different methodological, ontological, and epistemological foundations that influence research decisions. It is imperative that education and training in qualitative research give researchers the tools and skills they need to conduct high-quality research that is well-described and justified. A lack of adequate education and training compromises rigour and reduces the usefulness of qualitative research as a critical part of contemporary evidence generation and use.

#### **Professor Debra Jackson**

Professor of Nursing Susan Wakil School of Nursing The University of Sydney Australia

Professor Debra Jackson AO is Professor of Nursing, Research Impact and Engagement Lead (Nursing), and Research Academic Director Health Services in the Faculty of Medicine and Health at the University of Sydney. She has held leadership roles in research development and capacity-building in various faculties since 1995, and these roles have included Director of Research, Director of Research Training, Research Centre Director, and Institute Director.

She has over two decades of experience as a journal Editor and currently holds the post of Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Advanced Nursing, a well-established and highly ranked international Q1 journal. Prior to that she was the Editor-in-Chief of The Journal of Clinical Nursing for several years.

Professor Jackson has extensive supervision experience particularly of doctoral and post-doctoral candidates. In 2007 she was awarded the Vice-Chancellors Award for Excellence in Research Supervision and Training. She has examined more than 40 theses in Australia, Europe, Macau, Hong Kong, the United Kingdom and New Zealand. In 2022 she co-authored a book on doctoral supervision called 'Successful Doctoral Training in Nursing and Health Sciences'.

In 2015 she was the first nurse to be appointed to a Principal Fellowship of the NIHR-funded Oxford Biomedical Research Centre (Oxford UK), awarded in recognition of sustained contribution to generating knowledge to enhance the care of NHS patients.

In 2019 Professor Jackson was awarded Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) for distinguished service to medical education in the field of nursing practice and research as an academic and author.

Professor Jackson was named as Australia's leading nurse researcher by The Australian newspaper in their list of Australia's Top 250 Researchers in 2020 and again in 2021/2022, when she was also named Global Leader in nursing research. This is based on highest number of citations from papers published in the last five years in the 20 top journals in the field (https://www.theaustralian.com.au/special-reports/researchmagazine-2021). Her personal outputs include in excess of 400 publications and her work has been translated into Swedish, Danish, German and Spanish.

She holds the title of Professor Emerita at UTS, and honorary positions at: Florence Nightingale Faculty. Kings College, London (UK), University College Dublin (UK), Oxford Health NHS Foundation Trust (UK), Bournemouth School of Nursing (UK), Auckland University of Technology (NZ) and the Ngangk Yira Research Centre for Aboriginal Health and Social Equity at Murdoch University.



#### Topic: Qualitative Research in Nursing: Issues when Writing for Publication

Qualitative research approaches provide researchers with the means to study the social world and a lens into the life worlds of people living with or experiencing various health issues, their carers and health professionals. However, publishing qualitative data can be daunting and this can be so regardless of whether the data is derived from a pure qualitative study or presented as part of a mixed methods research report. Qualitative data often contains detailed, rich and highly nuanced accounts of phenomena and researchers may face challenges in reporting this data without reducing the fullness, strength and depth of the data. The task of researchers reporting qualitative data is to make a phenomenon come alive for the reader, in ways that convey the richness of the experience; allow the reader to gain an authentic glimpse into the life worlds of others; and contribute to the knowledge that can enhance practice, care quality and patient experience. In this presentation I will focus on some of the key issues to consider when seeking to publish qualitative data. Drawing on my experience as a researcher and journal editor, I will highlight common pitfalls and provide strategies to enhance publication success.

### **Dr Chiyoung Cha**

Dr. Chiyoung Cha is an Associate Professor at College of Nursing, Ewha Womans University. She teaches courses on Qualitative Nursing Research, Adult Health Nursing, and Global Nursing. She is the president of the Academy of Qualitative Research and Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Qualitative Research.

Dr. Cha's research interest is in health technology and women's health. Her current projects include development of Al based tailored program for nurse burnout funded by the National Research Foundation of Korea and a longitudinal study of Korean Nurses' Health funded by the Korean National Institute of Health.



#### **Topic: Numbers in Qualitative Research**


As a way of describing research data, numbers are used. Also, in qualitative research, even though the objective of is to investigate the inseparable nature of human experience and context, data are frequently explained with participant numbers in terms of data saturation. Simply presenting participant numbers to describe data and data saturation may mislead individuals into believing that obtaining a certain number of participants is sufficient to extract participant experiences. In this presentation, the number of participants and data of qualitative studies published in the Journal of Qualitative Research over the past two decades served as an illustration to examine the issue. In published phenomenology, grounded theory, ethnography, and narrative studies, regardless of qualitative approaches, studies with a small number of participants utilized extensive and multiple data to investigate human experiences. The method section of the journal is examined to initiate the discussion on how qualitative data should be presented using numbers.

#### **Professor Shuh-Jen Sheu**

Professor Institute of Community Health Care National Yang Ming Chiao Tung University Taiwan

The professional background of Dr Shuh-Jen Sheu is nursing, specializing in clinical and community psychiatric mental health nursing and geriatric nursing. She earned an M.S.N. (Master of Science in Nursing) degree in psychiatric mental health nursing at the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1992, where she learned hermeneutic inquiry and pedagogy with Dr Nancy Dieklemann. Next, Dr Babara Bower initiated to teach her grounded theory. Then, she went to the west coast, finished special training in gerontology nursing in 1993 and received a PhD in 1997 at the University of California-San Francisco, where she continuously studied grounded theory with Dr Anselm Strauss. In addition to advancing the above schools of thought and methodology, she pervasively learned the ethnicity and cultural care study during this period. Finally, she returned to Taiwan and taught at National Yang-Ming University in 1997, and now the school's name became National Yang Ming Chiao Tung University.



She also engaged in some external social participation. For example, she is the Director of the Zhou Meiyu Nursing Education Foundation and the Taiwan Bioethics Association. She played the role of the Teaching Evaluation Committee member of the Ministry of Education to assess the quality of teaching at the universities in Taiwan. She is a qualified lecturer conducting gender and sex education from the Gender Equality Committee in the Executive Yuan. In addition, she was a joint committee member invited by the Medical Policy Association for domestic Community Mental Health Center development in the 3rd Integrated Plan Field Evaluation Index Training Project Group. She would give domestic and international lectures or workshops on qualitative research, the philosophy of caring existentialism, and ethical consultation. She was ever invited as a keynote speaker to transact the knowledge on the caring philosophy or illness communication ethical issues by the Osaka University and Tohoku Sendai University in Japan and Manchester University in the U.K. in 2018. That year, she also became a visiting scholar at Ethox Center at Oxford University in the U.K.



# Topic: Qualitative Research in Mixed Methods Study: Taking the Breast Cancer Research as an Example

Women with early-stage breast cancer face the problems of limited information and scared emotion regarding breast cancer surgery decision-making in Taiwan. In clinics, we request to understand our clients' conditions and needs; meanwhile, we need to illustrate and test the effectiveness of the given intervention. Our research team applied a mix-method approach to demonstrate how we explore ways to solve these problems. In addition to quantitative methods, the qualitative approach of phenomenology study, action research and design thinking are extraordinarily valid methods for developing our network conversion expansion. A story about how we initially constructed a "Breast Cancer Surgery Decision-Aide Website" for women and consequently into developing a "Love Breast Ethical Learning Digital Platform" for healthcare students and professional novices will introduce.

The spirit of our research is to respect women's moral rights. Therefore, we tried to help them become aware of their bodily autonomy and appropriately facilitate their self-determination and decision-making capacity. We also used multi-dimensional ways to help medical care novices understand these women's situation and set it as a clinical and ethical education goal. Our research project integrates cross-disciplinary academic and technological expertise to conduct actual E-health website design and product completion. Creating a functional and user-friendly website is necessary and significant in the COVID-19 pandemic era.

#### **Dr Julia Slark**

Head and Associate Professor School of Nursing University of Auckland New Zealand

Associate Professor Julia Slark is the Head of School of Nursing at Waipapa Taumata Rau/University of Auckland. She qualified as a Registered Nurse in London, UK in 1993. She has 15 years' experience as a senior clinical nurse specialist in stroke patient care, and was part of the team at Imperial College NHS Trust which implemented the London-wide, new stroke strategy to provide urgent hyper-acute stroke interventions to London regional populations in 2009. Julia obtained her PhD from Imperial College London, in 2012 which looked at risk awareness as a tool to improve secondary stroke prevention strategies. Since arriving in New Zealand in 2013, Julia has led two stroke development projects in Auckland and Waikato to implement hyper-acute stroke services and she coordinates New Zealand's only stroke specialty nursing course. She was the academic director of the BNurs programme at the University of Auckland for five years prior to taking up the position of Head of School in 2019. Julia is the inaugural Chair of the Stroke Nurse Forum Aotearoa which was established in November 2020. Julia is an enthusiastic and committed nurse, educator and researcher who is passionate about providing the highest standards of care to patients. Her research interests include nursing, education and all aspects of stroke patient care.



#### **Topic: New Frontiers for Nursing Education**


Julia will attempt to take a quizzical look at nursing education in the context of a complex world of health service reforms, economic crisis and the fallout from a global pandemic. She will explore the challenges for nursing education in the face of a worldwide nursing shortage, the changing roles of nursing in health and health care delivery and the constantly shifting pace of health professional education. She will discuss the changing needs of quality clinical placements and the shift from hospital to community focussed placements and the need for more flexible structures in health care and education to provide a consumer-specific service. She will attempt to identify key questions for nursing education which include the question of clinical placement hours, quality clinical placements and what does the future classroom look like? She will discuss ideas for consideration such as flexible learning, changes in modes of assessment and competency assessment which meets the needs of the next generation and how nursing education can contribute to and meet the required outcomes of the sustainable development goals. She concludes with more questions than she started with!

# Topic: Internationalization of the Nursing Curriculum: Internationalization Abroad (IA) through Internationalization at Home (IaH) under the COVID-19 Pandemic

The internationalization of nursing curricula is far more important than ever in response to the rapid globalization of the world. Nurses are trained to be global-mindedness and equipped with intercultural skills in order to provide optimal healthcare to culturally diverse populations in different arenas. To internationalize the nursing curricula, the focus has been put on internationalization abroad (IA) where nursing students engage in those activities that take place across borders or in foreign countries. On the other hand, internationalization at home (IaH) is an emerging concept, where nursing students engage in those international and intercultural teaching and learning activities on domestic campus. To transform the nursing curriculum towards internationalization, we have strategized pedagogical innovations by integrating IA and IaH. First, students are provided with student exchange opportunities at partner universities. Then, their experiences of attending student exchange, no matter it is short term or semester-based, contribute to IaH. By exploring what nursing students have learned through IA regarding dimensions of intercultural competence and their sharing of views at domestic campus, we find out that it benefits students who have not been outgoing exchange. This is particularly eminent, when most face-to-face internationalization activities have been seriously affected by travel restrictions during the COVID-19 pandemic. That said, nursing education requires the preparation of graduates who are good global citizens and culturally competent. Internationalization of the nursing curriculum therefore needs to occur in a conscious manner with concurrent appraisal of the values underlying the activities through the implementation of IA and IaH.

#### **Professor Kristina Mikkonen**

Professor Research Unit of Health Science and Technology University of Oulu Finland

Professor Mikkonen is a Professor at the University of Oulu. She aspires to produce high-quality scientific research and educate new creative experts, educators, and leaders for the changing field of social and health care in partnership with the scientific community of nursing science at the University of Oulu, and with national and international collaborators. She leads a research group of Health Care Education and Competence (HealthEduCom). Her in-depth expertise is within the research area of education and competence of social and health care experts, work-related learning environments and mentoring, immigrant workforce, and digital technology education. As a principal investigator, Professor Mikkonen leads international and national research projects by actively implementing research outcomes in an educational context with students, educators, researchers, and organizational leaders. She integrates students into her research projects and guide them in the development and implementation of new evidence into educational and/or clinical practice.



#### Topic: Perspectives and Challenges in Designing Clinical Placements and Mentoring

The healthcare sector is constantly changing with the introduction of new patient care treatment recommendations, nursing practices, and organizational structures, as well as a changing demographic structure. Additionally, the global nursing workforce deficit in 2020 was estimated as 5.9 million, and statistics show that one out of six nurses is projected to retire by the year 2030. This high retirement rate will exacerbate nurse workforce shortages. The healthcare sector needs to be ensured with highly qualified future healthcare professionals and a reduction of staff turnover. Healthcare education plays an important role in healthcare crisis prevention and healthcare quality sustainability. Evidence shows that healthcare students already have higher stress and lower psychological well-being in the later years of their studies. Building safe clinical learning environments and enhancing evidence-based nurse mentors' competence can secure students' learning experiences and professional development. Innovation needs to be enhanced by evidence-based education and the building of collaborative bridges between the healthcare sector and higher education institutions.

#### **Dr Sam Liu**

Associate Professor School of Exercise Science, Physical & Health Education University of Victoria Canada

Sam Liu is an Associate Professor in the School of Exercise Science, Physical and Health Education, and the Director of the Digital Health Lab at the University of Victoria, Canada. His research focuses on two main areas: 1) developing and evaluating the effectiveness of digital communication technology (e.g., mobile phones, social media) to promote physical activity and well-being, 2) finding innovative ways to monitor and predict behaviours and health outcomes using big data in order to better target and personalize digital health interventions. Dr Liu is a Michael Smith Health Research Scholar and a research fellow at the Institute of Aging and Lifelong Health. He is an associated editor of Frontiers in Digital Health.



#### Topic: Physical Activity and Health Promotion Using Innovative mHealth Technology

Helping people to increase engagement in health-promoting behaviors such as physical activity is recognized by the World Health Organization (WHO) as a "vital investment" to reducing global burden of non-communicable chronic diseases (NCDs), including mental illness. NCDs are projected to contribute to economic loss of US\$47 trillion by 2031, and result in 41 million deaths/year. However, many countries around the world have made little progress in turning the tide in the adoption of healthier lifestyles such as regular physical activity. Thus, innovative solutions are desperately needed. Recent research has shown that mHealth technologies can be useful tools to promote physical activity and health. Specifically, mHealth applications along with wearable technologies can help researchers understand important health behaviours in natural contexts (i.e., outside the lab, in everyday life) and implement effective and scalable public health initiatives. In this talk, I will describe the opportunities and challenges of using mHealth technologies in physical activity and health promotion research. I will discuss the ongoing work that leverages mHealth and wearable technology to understand physical activity behaviours using ecological momentary assessments and to design adaptive just-in-time-adaptive physical activity interventions. Finally, I will share the strategies and tools available to help researchers leverage eHealth technology for their research and practice.

#### **Dr Edmund Lee**

Assistant Director Centre for Information Integrity and the Internet (IN-Cube) Nanyang Technological University Singapore

Dr Edmund W. J. Lee is an Assistant Professor at the Wee Kim Wee School of Communication and Information at Nanyang Technological University, Singapore, and Assistant Director at the Centre for Information Integrity and the Internet (IN-cube). He previously was a postdoctoral research fellow at the Harvard Chan School of Public Health and Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

As a public health communication scientist, Dr Lee's research focuses on developing health technologies to tackle health inequalities, and how to take advantage of digital traces—data from social media, smartphones, wearables, and electronic health records—in an intelligent and ethical manner to understand and improve public health outcomes.

Dr Lee previously served as a Global Future Council Fellow at the World Economic Forum, working with global industry thought leaders in advising the global agenda on responsible big data use. His research had won numerous prestigious awards at international conferences such as International Communication Association, National Communication Association, and the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication. For his scholarly contributions, he was conferred the title of McQuail Honorary Fellow by the Amsterdam School of Communication Research in 2020.



#### Topic: Big Data, Health Technologies, and Social Media: Boon or Bane for Health Professionals?


The proliferation of health-related data generated from digital technologies such as social media, search engines, mobile health apps, and wearables has ushered in an unprecedented opportunity for public health researchers to tap on both "naturally occurring" and structured data (e.g., surveys) to improve population health. Despite the sophistication and promises such technologies, the allure of "health tech" and "big data" approaches in understanding public health may fall short of the hype they generated, unless they account for the broader context of individuals' lived experiences and reality. In this presentation, Dr Edmund Lee would share from his research various approaches to utilizing health technologies (social media, smartphones, wearables) and the "big data" generated for population health, the pitfalls to avoid, and highlight future opportunities for public health researchers and practitioners.

### **Dr Kelvin Wang**

#### **Topic: mHealth Interventions for Smoking Cessation during COVID-19 Pandemic**

Systematic reviews and meta-analyses of observational studies have shown that current smokers have a higher risk of severe COVID-19 and death. A systematic review of Mendelian randomization studies also showed that smoking traits (smoking initiation, smoking heaviness, lifetime smoking index) were associated with increased COVID-19 hospitalization, severity and mortality. A potential mechanism is the upregulation of angiotensin converting enzyme-2 receptors (the adhesion site of SARS-CoV-2) in the respiratory tract due to cigarette smoke exposure. Mask removal and the hand-to-mouth action of smoking may also predispose smokers to viral exposure. However, there is a widespread misinformation on the protective effects of smoking on COVID-19 and the closedown of usual smoking cessation services had adversely affect smoking cessation during COVID-19 pandemic. We assessed the changes of smoking behaviors, misinformation on smoking and the effect of mobile health (mHealth) interventions for promoting smoking cessation during COVID-19 pandemic.

### **Professor Raymond Chan**

Director and Matt Flinders Professor of Cancer Nursing Caring Futures Institute Flinders University Australia

Prof Raymond (Ray) Chan is Matthew Flinders Professor of Cancer Nursing, and Director for the Caring Futures Institute, Flinders University. He is a current NHMRC Investigator Fellow (2021-25). Prof Chan's research program focuses on optimising models of care and health services' responses to address the needs of people affected by cancer. Prof Chan has published 190 peer-reviewed articles and 2 book chapters. In total, he has attracted >\$35 million AUD of research funding as CI (>\$19.5 million AUD as CIA). In 2009, his contribution to nursing practice, education, and research was recognised with the award as Fellow of the Royal College of Nursing Australia (FRCNA, now FACN). He is a Past President of the Cancer Nurses Society of Australia (CNSA), the peak professional body for cancer nursing in Australia. During his term of CNSA Presidency (2014: President Elect, 2015-2017: President), he also served on the Executive Council of the Clinical Oncology Society of Australia (COSA). Currently, Prof Chan is an advisor to Cancer Australia – the federal government agency for cancer control. In addition, he holds/has held a range of international and national leadership roles including Executive Board Director and Chair of the Survivorship Study Group of Multinational Association of Supportive Care in Cancer (MASCC); and Board Director for the International Society of Nurses in Cancer Care (ISNCC). In 2021, Prof Chan was appointed by the Federal Minister of Health to serve on the NHMRC Research Committee (Triennium 2021-24).



#### Topic: Self-management Support in Chronic Disease Management: What's the Trick?

"Self-care" and "self-management" are not new concepts. Indeed, nurses get familiarised with theories such as Orem's Self Care Deficit Theory in their undergraduate training. Shifting from a medically-centric model where care is done "to" patients, there has been a growing appreciation of supported self-management where patients are regarded as drivers of care and partners in care. It is evident in the literature that research on self-management programs has continued to grow over time. However, in practice, nurses and other health professionals are not yet optimising self-management support. Across many healthcare systems and settings, there is plenty of room to improve to maximise the implementation of supported self-management. So what is the trick? This presentation will discuss several strategies to advance implementation that will enhance self-management support for people with chronic conditions.

#### **Professor Doris Yu**

Professor Doris Yu is Professor at the School of Nursing, LKS Faculty of Medicine, The University of Hong Kong. Her research expertise is in gerontology and geriatric care, with particularly focus on care model development for promoting healthy ageing, optimizing management of dementia and heart failure and increasing informal care capacity. She has obtained over USD 3 million research grant to support the research work in the field. Her work has been published in top-tier journals in nursing, gerontology and cardiology. Professor Yu is the Associate Editor of the Journal of Advanced Nursing, Plos One and Journal of Long-term Care. She is currently the Associate Director of the Sau Po Center on Ageing, The University of Hong Kong to support inter-disciplinary research in ageing. Professor Yu engages actively in knowledge translation, and successfully secured about \$ 12 million of donations to implement evidence-based programs to optimized aged care. She is the Fellow of American Academy of Nursing, and serving that Ageing Expert Panel. She is also the member of several expert advisory panels of the Hong Kong Government and NGOs to support priority-setting for research funding and aged care policy.



#### **Topic: Unlock the Strengths for Living Well with Dementia**

Dementia is a deteriorating neurological pathology characterized by cognitive deficits, functional decline and neuropsychiatric symptoms. A person living with this condition experiences progressive deterioration in physical and psychosocial well-being. While the global population ageing continues to mark dementia on an ever-rising epidemiological trend, the progressive disorientating and debilitating nature of this condition has greatly jeopardizes the quality of life of both persons living with this condition and their family caregivers. International guidelines hence place strong advocacy for the promotion of living well with dementia. Aligning well with this advocacy, this presentation will frame dementia care and support in a salutogenic paradigm. The speaker will discuss the importance of refocusing on the strengths of the persons with dementia and their family caregivers in identifying therapeutic intervention to promote living well with dementia. Theory-based strategies to identify and mobilize the strengths of the care dyads in an individual and family context will be introduced. Empirical evaluation of strength-based therapeutic care at individual and dyadic level in dementia context will be discussed.

Brendan's research focuses on person-centredness with a particular focus on the development of person-centred cultures, practices and processes. He has engaged in this work at all levels from theory development to implementation science and through to instrument design, testing and evaluation. He is methodologically diverse, but is most at home in participatory/action research. Whilst he has a particular expertise in gerontology and dementia practices, his work has spanned all specialities and is multiprofessional. Visit www.cpcpr.org for further info. He also has a particular focus on the use of arts and creativity in healthcare research and development. Brendan has more than 600 published outputs, including 240 peer-reviewed publications in international journals and 12 books. He was the founding editor of "International Journal of Older People Nursing" and is currently 'Editor Emeritus' of the journal. Brendan is a Fellow of The European Academy of Nursing Science, Fellow of the Royal College of Nursing, Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland and Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing. In 2014 he was awarded the 'International Nurse Researcher Hall of Fame' by Sigma Theta Tau International and listed in the Thomson Reuters 3000 most influential researchers globally. In 2015 he was recognized as an 'Inspirational Nursing Leader' by Nursing Times (UK nursing magazine) and in 2019 was listed in the New Year 'Top 100 outstanding nurses' by the Twitter Group #wenurses. Most recently, Brendan was featured in the Wiley Publishers 'Inspiring Minds' short films series https://www. youtube.com/watch?v=13c5C-tbcT4 In 2022 Brendan was selected as a member of The Academia Europaea.



#### Topic: Reablement and Older People: A Person-Centred Approach

Rehabilitation is a well-established field of practice in nursing. However, in rehabilitation research, the dominant focus is on the acute phase following a diagnosis and on activities that happen in in-patient services. For many (older) people living with a long-term condition, the real needs for rehabilitation happen after this period when they are dealing with everyday aspects of life. Reablement focuses on normalization and community engagement. It privileges the need to help older people to remain socially connected and maximises the potential of all persons to flourish. In this presentation I will focus on reablement from a person-centred perspective and the need for all older people to be helped to flourish as persons in society.

Dr. Marie Tarrant is a Professor in the UBC Okanagan School of Nursing and served as the School's Director from 2016 to 2021. She is currently the Dean *pro tem* of the Faculty of Health and Social Development. Dr. Tarrant is the lead investigator in the School of Nursing Maternal and Child Health Lab and is a frequently cited UBC expert on maternal and child health issues. Her areas of research focus are breastfeeding—including the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative to protect, promote and support breastfeeding—and maternal and childhood vaccine hesitancy, including COVID-19 vaccine hesitancy. She has co-authored 75 peer-reviewed publications in high-impact maternal and child health and public health journals. The goal of Dr. Tarrant's research is to inform public health policies and help transform perinatal healthcare services to improve maternal and child health outcomes.



# Topic: COVID-19 Vaccination during Pregnancy and Breastfeeding: Understanding Hesitancy and Predictors of Vaccine Uptake

COVID-19 infection in unvaccinated pregnant persons increases the risk of hospitalization and ICU admission, preterm birth, emergency caesarean section, stillbirth, and maternal death. Despite these outcomes, those who are pregnant, and breastfeeding have been reticent to receive the COVID-19 vaccine, primarily due to fears of possible negative effects on the fetus or the baby. Additionally, the lack of early data on vaccine safety in pregnant and childbearing people and the initial unclear vaccine recommendations contributed to increased vaccine hesitancy among these groups. The purpose of this study was to explore COVID-19 vaccine hesitancy among people who were pregnant or breastfeeding and to identify factors associated with vaccine uptake. We conducted a cross-sectional study of 864 pregnant and breastfeeding participants in British Columbia (BC), Canada from October to December 2021. Participants were recruited through social media advertisements, the local health authorities, and pregnancy and postpartum support groups. The survey assessed demographic characteristics, vaccination status, and vaccine hesitancy using the 10-item WHO vaccine hesitancy scale, adapted for pregnancy and breastfeeding. Study findings showed that 68.7% and 74.3% of pregnant and breastfeeding participants had received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine. The most common reported reasons for receiving the COVID-19 vaccine were wanting to protect others, believing that COVID-19 was a serious disease, concern about contracting COVID-19, and trust in public health recommendations around the vaccine. Unvaccinated participants reported concerns about vaccine side-effects for the baby and themselves, the rapid development of the COVID-19 vaccine, and believing the vaccine did not protect against COVID-19 infection. Factors positively associated with COVID-19 vaccination were higher maternal education level, higher family income, living in the Northern BC, and lower vaccine hesitancy. With up to one-third of participants unvaccinated against COVID-19, clear communication regarding vaccine safety and efficacy in preventing serious disease is critical to reducing vaccine hesitancy and promoting vaccine uptake.

#### **Dr Anna Lee**

Assistant Professor College of Nursing Yonsei University South Korea

Dr Anna Lee is an Assistant Professor in the School of Nursing, Yonsei University. She received a BSN and an MSN from Korea University in 2005 and 2009, respectively. She received her Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 2019. The primary focus of her research is the quality of life (QoL) in children with developmental disabilities (DDs) and their families. Much of her work has been about understanding the relationships between the QoL of children with DDs and family factors. She has also been developing mobile healthcare applications for the target population. Recently, she received a research grant from the National Research Foundation of Korea to develop the Korean version of the Stepping Stones Triple-P which is a family-centered invention for children's developmental and behavioral issues.



#### **Topic: Quality of Life in Children with Special Needs and Families**

The number of children with special needs including developmental disabilities has continued to rise globally. Investigators have reported that the overall quality of life of children with special needs is lower than typically developing children. Families of children with special needs cope with frequent and high demands, often including chronic medical and educational challenges that require lifelong management. The strong association between family variables and the quality of life of children with special needs has been confirmed by several studies. Therefore, the approach focusing on the families of children with special needs is salient to enhance the quality of life in children with special needs.

Along with the fourth industrial revolution, innovative digital healthcare technologies have been sought to provide optimal healthcare services for children with special needs and their families. mHealth technologies have been utilized for several purposes including offering educational interventions and promoting health behaviors that are associated with the quality of life of the children and families.

More studies examining the quality of life of children with special needs and families are needed to gain a more in-depth understanding of their experiences. Additionally, digital healthcare technologies should be considered promising methods to enhance the quality of life of the population. It is indispensable for healthcare providers to be trained in the effective use of digital healthcare technologies to provide ongoing healthcare services even in lockdowns such as COVID-19.

#### **Dr Kris Lok**

Assistant Professor School of Nursing LKS Faculty of Medicine, The University of Hong Kong Hong Kong

Dr Kris Lok is an Assistant Professor in the School of Nursing at The University of Hong Kong. She has worked throughout her career to maternal and child health research, with a focus on breastfeeding, infant feeding, human milk and gut microbiome, the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative and development and use of digital technologies in healthcare and healthcare education.

Dr Kris Lok advances the body of research in maternal and child health outcomes with a focus on breastfeeding. She was commissioned from the Food and Health Bureau to launch a Breastfeeding Friendly community Initiative Program to support breastfeeding in the community. Their team developed a user-friendly breastfeeding app as well as building support and awareness in the community. Dr Lok works together with the Hospital Authority, Department of Health and non-government organisations to improve awareness of the needs of breastfeeding mothers and change behaviour in the community. Her research seeks to inform public policies and transform perinatal healthcare services.

Dr Kris Lok, was awarded in 2021, Faculty Knowledge Exchange Award, for the Baby Friendly Community Initiative Program – Development of a New Breastfeeding GPS App. Most recently, she served as the Committee member on Publicity on Breastfeeding – Promotion of Breastfeeding Family Health Service, Department of Health, Hong Kong SAR Government.



## Topic: Transforming Breastfeeding Culture: Implementation of Breastfeeding Friendly Community Initiative

Although it is well recognized that breastfeeding is extremely beneficial for child and maternal health and is one of the most effective health interventions for preventing infant and child mortality and promoting lifelong maternal health, breastfeeding continuation rates are low in Hong Kong. To protect, promote, and support breastfeeding, the WHO and UNICEF developed the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiatives (BFHI) as a global program in 1991. The BFHI is a set of 10 maternity practices that hospitals should implement to support breastfeeding. The BFHI is an evidence-based effective intervention that contributes to increasing the initiation, exclusivity and duration of breastfeeding. The BFHI has had a positive impact on breastfeeding rates, but other interventions are needed after hospital discharge to meet the recommended targets at 6 months. In 2009, WHO encouraged health care systems to scale up the protection, promotion, and support of breastfeeding at the community level 5. Community support through training and social marketing is a vital link in an effective and sustainable program. We aim to remove the existing barriers and promote a positive shift in knowledge and attitudes of a breastfeeding friendly culture. The project aim to provide training based on an accredited framework (BFCI) for staff, management and mothers among public places in the community to promulgate breastfeeding friendly attitudes. This will consequently strengthen and support mothers during postnatal care in Hong Kong and to prevent low breastfeeding exclusivity as well as improve facilities in public venues under transparency. The experiences implementing the BFCI in Hong Kong can provide evidence based tools for decision makers in policy and health systems to advance breastfeeding protection, promotion and support globally.
