



Nursing and Nurses of the Future

With the aging of population and rapid advancement in technology, the healthcare environment of the future will be rapidly evolving. Healthcare needs and ways to deliver health care will be different from those of today. The required skill sets and talents of the future nurses will not be the same. The questions of what, who & how should we start preparing for the future become a major challenge that has to be addressed today.



Professor Afaf I. Meleis

Professor of Nursing and Sociology and Dean Emerita, School of Nursing University of Pennsylvania, the United States

Over the course of more than five decades, Dr. Afaf I. Meleis has demonstrated a profound passion for pushing the boundaries of nursing science, cultivating the next generation of healthcare leaders and improving women's health. As the Dean of the University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing and Director of the School's WHO Collaborating Center for Nursing and Midwifery Leadership (2002-2014), she fostered a voiced, empowered community dedicated to making an impact on global healthcare through multidisciplinary partnerships that are advancing nursing science, education and practice.

Before Dr. Meleis made her move to Philadelphia, the world-renowned medical sociologist was rounding 34 years at the University of California at San Francisco, where she was a professor and where she held several administrative positions, including chairing the status-for-women committee and acting as assistant dean for academic programs, all while teaching and mentoring hundreds of students and conducting influential research on women's health.

A leading expert on immigrant and women's health, Dr. Meleis has dedicated her career to ensuring vulnerable populations are given a voice, particularly women who are burdened by societal inequities, multiplicity of roles, differential compensation and rewards and the gender divide. She used this knowledge to redefine women's work and contributions and to develop Transitions Theory, which continues to be used globally and is translated into policy, research and practice.

In addition, her research and writings in over 200 interdisciplinary publications on these topics, as well as on the structure and organization of nursing knowledge, have had an impact on advancing global health, women's health, culturally-competent practice and on the epistemological analysis of the discipline of nursing. She is also the author of 50 chapters, 7 books and numerous monographs, proceedings and policy papers. Her books continue to be used internationally, chief among them, *Transitions Theory: Middle Range and Situation Specific Theories in Research and Practice* and several editions of the ground breaking *Theoretical Nursing: Development and Progress*, with a 6th edition expected to be published in 2017. Her co-edited book, *Women's Health and the World's Cities*, innovatively examines the relationship between global urbanization and women's health and is just one example of her far-reaching research, as it was widely disseminated through international networks, conferences and launches, which in turn inspired collaboration and change.

A reflection of the international impact of her work is also evident in her world-wide consultations, invited keynotes and mentorship of students, faculty, clinicians and administrators. Her leadership in the International Council on Women's Health Issues played a central role in inspiring scholarship in women's health and in bringing together world leaders to form partnerships to improve the lives of women. Her leadership is also evident in the many boards and committees she actively participates in, including her role as a board member of Aga Khan University and a board member of The Buck Institute for Research on Aging. She is a member of the National Academy of Medicine and co-chaired its Global Forum on Innovation in Health Professional Education, as well as a board member of The Josiah Macy Jr. Foundation Faculty Scholars program. She co-chaired the Harvard-Penn-Lancet Commission on Women and Health, the results of which were published in a full Lancet issue in 2015. She is also a member of a CSIS Global Health Policy Center Task Force on Women's and Family Health, which will provide the newly elected U.S. President and Administration with a road map, addressing how they can best contribute to the spectrum of issues impacting the health of women and families globally.

Dr. Meleis is the recipient of numerous honors and awards, as well as honorary professorships and doctorates. Among them is a Doctorate of Medicine from Linköping University, Sweden; a Doctor Honoris Causa from the University of Alicante, Spain; and the distinguished Honorary Citizenship of Oporto, Portugal. In 2015 she received the American Academy of Nursing Living Legend Award and the Sigma Theta Tau International Nell J. Watts Lifetime Achievement in Nursing Award, and she was inducted as an Honorary Fellow in the National League for Nursing's Academy of Nursing Education.

Dr. Meleis graduated Magna Cum Laude from the University of Alexandria (1961), earned an M.S. in nursing (1964), an M.A. in sociology (1966) and a Ph.D. in medical and social psychology (1968) from the University of California, Los Angeles.

Through her life's work, Dr. Meleis has simultaneously raised the visibility of the nursing profession and the growing importance of addressing the social inequities facing women around the world.

Envisioning the Future: Innovation, Interprofessionalism and Influence

This is both an inspiring and a challenging time for nursing as a discipline and as a profession. Nurses are positioned to lead in making a positive impact on the access to and provision of quality, community based, equitable care for populations globally. To realize and maximize the capacity of nurses, both individually and collectively, in enhancing the health of populations while curbing costs, the education and practice of nurses must be driven by frameworks that encompass social justice and equity, as well as by an awareness of health care challenges and opportunities created by global demographic, social, epidemiological and environmental transitions. Opportunities for nurses to shape the future of health care could be harnessed by making the necessary changes to education and practice, which could drive and maximize nursing innovations in research and practice, voiced leadership in interprofessional education and practice and the development and implementation of impactful social and health policies that drive progress toward a universal culture of health and wellbeing and meeting the Sustainable Development Goals.



Professor Patricia Davidson

Dean, School of Nursing Johns Hopkins University, the United States

Patricia Davidson, PhD, Med, RN, FAAN, joined Johns Hopkins School of Nursing in September 2013 as Dean. Since then she has introduced a new pre-licensure degree program, Master's Entry into Nursing, and progressed advanced practice degrees to the Doctor of Nursing Practice, doubled the school's PhD program intake and increased engagement with communities, locally, nationally and internationally. A global leader in cardiac health for women and vulnerable populations, Dr. Davidson has an established program of research in supporting individuals living with chronic conditions and developing innovative models of transitional care. A primary objective of her work has been to improve the cardiovascular health of underserved populations through development of innovative, acceptable, and sustainable initiatives internationally. She is a leader in advocating for palliative care for non-malignant conditions. Since 2003, Dr. Davidson has secured over \$25 million in competitive research funding from national and international funding bodies, and co-authored 460-plus peer-reviewed journal articles, 25 book chapters, and more than 150 peer-reviewed abstracts. Dr. Davidson is Counsel General of the International Council on Women's Health Issues and is a member of Sigma Theta Tau International's Institute for Global Healthcare Leadership Advisory Board, Mentorship Committee and Foundation Board Chair. She is a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, the American Heart Association, the Preventive Cardiovascular Nurses Association and the Australian College of Nursing.

Shaping the Image and Value Proposition of Nursing for the Future

Globally nurses are integral to not just providing clinical care but advancing nursing research, innovation, and advocacy for better healthcare. The image of nursing is frequently misrepresented and fails to provide a contemporary and accurate image of activities in policy, practice, education and research. Nursing is undergoing an extraordinary transformation. While nurses know this and see it in the work they do every day, there is a profound need to educate the public about a changing nursing landscape and expanding opportunities. As we face an international nursing shortage and an increasing demand for health care services, a focus on recruitment and retention is critical. The Johns Hopkins School of Nursing has launched a longitudinal campaign, "The *New Script of Nursing*". Through using a multi-media digital approach, stereotypes are challenged and we illustrate the value proposition of a nursing career across numerous settings. Leveraging social media and a wide range of engagement activities is important in profiling the work of nurses as well as motivating and inspiring both future and current nurses. Shaping the image and describing the value proposition of nursing is critical in ensuring a competent, confident, and credentialed workforce for the future.



Professor Meinir Krishnasamy

Chair in Cancer Nursing, Department of Nursing The University of Melbourne, Australia

Mei is Chair in Cancer Nursing at the University of Melbourne and Research and Education Lead in Cancer Nursing at the Victorian Comprehensive Cancer Centre in Melbourne. She is Honorary Senior Research Fellow at the Olivia Newton John Cancer, Wellness and Research Centre, the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, and the Royal Melbourne Hospital in Victoria, Australia. Mei is chief investigator on several national research projects that focus on improving patient experiences of cancer care and has a particular interest in the relationship between patient experience and health outcomes. She sits on several national expert cancer policy committees, including Cancer Australia and Cancer Council Australia. Mei is immediate past President of the Clinical Oncology Society of Australia and past President of the Cancer Nurses Society of Australia.

Creating Tomorrow through Co-design

Despite remarkable advances in cancer medicine that have delivered extraordinary benefits for some groups of people, for many patients, tomorrow will still be today. Excellent communication skills; access to timely, relevant supportive care, and access to coordinated pathways of care, will continue to be of paramount importance. Increasingly there is recognition that the delivery of safe, efficacious and effective care is reliant on co-design, where the voice of the patient has equal status to that of health professionals.

The purpose of this paper will be to illustrate the importance of co-design work as a critical component of informing the nursing research of tomorrow; in creating the knowledge to innovate nursing practice, and in transforming models of care to optimise patient experience and health outcomes. The paper will draw on data from three, nurse-led co-design studies to generate knowledge for cancer nursing practice today and tomorrow: 1) The development of innovative co-design communication-skills educational resources for nurses who work with people affected by cancer; 2) The development of a patient informed supportive care resource for people affected by pancreatic cancer and, 3) The development of patient and family informed pathways of care for frail older adults with cancer.



Professor Pamela Kulbok

Theresa A. Thomas Professor of Primary Care Nursing and Professor of Public Health Sciences, School of Nursing University of Virginia, the United States

Pamela is the Theresa A. Thomas Professor of Primary Care Nursing and Professor of Public Health Sciences at the University of Virginia (UVA). She is Coordinator of the Public Health Nursing (PHN) Leadership track and Acting Coordinator of the Health Systems Management (HSM) track of the MSN Program. Dr. Kulbok is a fellow in the American Academy of Nursing (AAN). She recently served as Co-Chair of the AAN Expert Panel on Environmental and Public Health. Dr. Kulbok is an editorial board member for Public Health Nursing, the Journal of Nursing Measurement, and the Online Journal of Issues in Nursing. She received the 2016 American Public Health Association (APHA), PHN Section, Ruth B. Freeman Distinguished Career Award. She was a member of the APHA, PHN Section workgroup to revise the Definition of Public Health Nursing (2013) and was Co-Chair of the American Nurses Association (ANA) workgroup that revised the Public Health Nursing: Scope and Standards of Practice (2013). Dr. Kulbok was principal investigator on several research grants including an interprofessional, cross-institution, three-year project funded by the Virginia Foundation for Healthy Youth: Partnering with Rural Youth and Parents to Design and Test a Substance Use Prevention Program. She co-directed advanced education nursing (AEN) training grants: 1) Nursing Leadership in Rural Health Care; and, 2) HSM and PHN Leadership. These grants led the UVA School of Nursing in the provision of quality, distance education for nurses living in rural areas of the South. She was an Inaugural Faculty and Faculty Fellow, Healthy Appalachia Institute, UVA's College at Wise, National Network of Public Institutes. She completed a four-year term on the ANA, Congress of Nursing Practice and Economics and was a contributor to Nursing's Social Policy Statement (2010). Dr. Kulbok also contributed to the Association of Community Health Nursing Educators (ACHNE) position papers on graduate education for public health nursing. She is a past president of ACHNE and two-term member of the Quad Council Coalition of PHN Organizations. She was a recipient of the UVA School of Nursing Distinguished Professor Award and the UVA USEMS Outstanding Teaching Award. Prior to her appointment as faculty at UVA, she was faculty at The Catholic University of America and the University of Illinois at Chicago where she directed public health nursing AEN training grants. She completed a post-doctoral traineeship in Psychiatric Epidemiology at Washington University, St. Louis, MO. She earned her master's degree in community health nursing and her undergraduate degree from Boston College and her doctoral degree from Boston University.

Local to Global Public Health "Matters": A Call to Nurses

When creating future nursing practice, education, and research, why does public health "matter"? To address this question, we must understand the context of transnational forces that are at play in health care. Significant national and global influences on the health of populations worldwide include innovations in healthcare delivery, as well as a range of threats to population health and health equity. Historical analysis is used to explore the influence of contextual forces on public health nursing in the United States and globally in the early decades of the twenty-first century. Seminal milestones of this period are analyzed to frame lessons learned and public health "matters" for the future. Opportunities and threats impact the capacity of public health nursing to promote population health. Opportunities include emphasis on the "triple aim," the "culture of health," and the "new public health." Threats include global conflicts, global disparities, emerging communicable diseases, and increased chronic illnesses. These milestones changed the landscape of PHN, yet the classic definition to promote and protect the health of populations endures. Growing interest in population health, in the throes of uncertain healthcare reforms, provides an imperative for nursing to reclaim a lead role in promoting health equity; to join with public and private partners; to utilize public health competencies and science; and to co-create a base of influence and power for social change and progress. Demonstrating that public health "matters" can provide meaningful opportunities to build upon assets, address challenges, reduce complacency, and leverage advocacy and optimism for the future.



Professor John Daly

Dean, Faculty of Health Head, WHO Collaborating Centre for Nursing, Midwifery & Health Development University of Technology Sydney, Australia

Professor Daly is an active professional and academic leader, educator, administrator, consultant, researcher, author and editor. He has published widely on leadership in nursing and health, nursing education, cardiovascular health, role transition in nursing, aged care, cross-cultural nursing and nursing workforce issues. Professor Daly is a former Chair of the Global Alliance for Leadership in Nursing Education and Science (GANES), a former Chair of the Council of Deans of Nursing and Midwifery (Australia and New Zealand) and former Editor-In-Chief of Collegian: The Australian Journal of Nursing Practice, Scholarship & Research (the refereed journal of the Australian College of Nursing which is published by Elsevier) a position he held for 9 years.

Professor Daly has served on many committees and working parties over many years with local, national and international organizations including: NSW Health, The Health-Science Alliance, Sydney Alliance for Healthcare, Research & Training (SAHRT), the Council of Deans of Nursing & Midwifery (Australia and New Zealand), the World Health Organization, Sigma Theta Tau International (STTI), and the International Network for Doctoral Education in Nursing. He is a member of the Board of Directors of AccessUTS, the Health Science Alliance and the Council of the Academic Health Science Partnership (AHSP).

In 2008 Professor Daly was awarded the title Emeritus Professor by the University of Western Sydney for distinguished service to the university and contributions to the discipline and profession of nursing at national and international levels. In 2013 he was elected to Fellowship in the American Academy of Nursing (FAAN). In July 2014 he was invested as Secretary-General for the Global Network of World Health Organization Collaborating Centres for Nursing & Midwifery (www.globalnetworkwhocc.com), and he was the only Australian nurse academic appointed to the STTI Global Advisory Panel on the Future of Nursing (GAPFON). Professor Daly continues to play an active leadership role in academic publishing having been appointed to the position of Editor-In-Chief of the Journal of Nursing Management (Wiley, Oxford) in August, 2014. In 2016 he was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Nursing by Oxford Brookes University, UK in recognition of outstanding contribution to the pursuit of academic excellence. He currently holds a number of adjunct, conjoint or visiting appointments with other academic institutions including: Curtin University, Huazhong University of Science & Technology (HUST), Wuhan, China, and Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, USA.

Nursing Leadership in Advancing Global Health

This paper presents a summary of nursing leadership projects and innovations in which the author is currently involved with a number of leading international organisations which are aligned, and collaborative in nature. It includes an overview of contemporary international nursing leadership strategy, and provides concrete examples of how advances can be achieved through consensus building and purposeful collaboration with benefits for the discipline and profession of nursing, population health and health system strengthening. The paper includes a review of the role of the World Health Organisation in advancing global health taking account of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's), analysis of barriers and facilitators to implementation of the SDG's and Global strategic directions for strengthening nursing and midwifery 2016-2020, and discussion of leadership priorities and strategies for nursing to further enhance professional and disciplinary contributions to improving global health.
